LAWS

ON

DRUGS

Controlled substances—a.k.a. any substances that the State of Idaho has deemed illegal to possess, sell, manufacture, or distribute—are broken down into six different “Schedules” or classes of drug by Idaho Law. Possessing these substances without an appropriate prescription subjects the holder to heavy legal penalties. Become familiar with the drug schedules to ensure you don’t break the law:

SCHEDULE I

drugs/substances that are not currently accepted for any medical uses and threaten high risk of abuse (heroin, marijuana, ecstasy, opiates, hallucinogenic drugs, opium derivatives)

SCHEDULE II

used under appropriate written or oral prescriptions from medical professionals but still present severe health risks if abused (morphine, methadone, oxycodone, codeine)

SCHEDULE III

generally accepted medical uses (typically to help with pain, appetite, or as anesthesia) that are less likely to be abused than Schedule I or II, but that may cause low to moderate dependence if abused (tylenol, ketamine)

Full List: Idaho Code 37-2709

SCHEDULE IV

currently accepted medical uses (typically to help with pain), lower risk of dependence/abuse than Schedule III, and considered to be minimally dangerous (zolpidem, lorazepam, diazepam, triazolam)

Full List: Idaho Code 37-2711

SCHEDULE V

considered minimally dangerous with very low potential for abuse; restricted exclusively to medical use (codeine, pregabalin, atropine, ezogabine)

Full List: Idaho Code 37-2713

SCHEDULE VI

drugs that are not regulated by the FDA and are used recreationally to get high; also known as “poppers”

Full List: Idaho Code 37-2713A

Fraudulent actions taken to obtain, possess, create, and/or distribute substances illegally puts the possessor at risk of a misdemeanor or felony conviction, and they may face steep fines, prison sentencing, or both.
